CONIFERS					
American Arborvitae	60	15	M	P-F	Soft, green needles with spreading flat sprays. Provides wildlife with shelter and food.
Colorado Blue Spruce	60	20	S	P-F	A conical-shaped evergreen tree with short stiff needles. Often used in residential landscapes.
Common Bald Cypress	70	30	M	P-F	Soft, feathery needles turn russet-red in Autumn. Loses its needles in winter and grows new set in Spring.
Douglas Fir	80	20	S-M	P-F	Although not a true fir, it is a beautiful evergreen with a conical shape for the larger landscape.
Norway Spruce	60	30	M-R	P-F	A large, pyramidal tree with long, cylindrical cones that hang on the dark green weeping branches. Adaptable and good for windbreaks.
Red Pine	50	30	M	F	An evergreen conifer. Its shape is upright oval in youth, becoming more spreading but still symmetrical with age. Its young scaly bark is a distinct orange-red, while its mature platy bark is more red-brown.
White Pine	80	40	M-R	P-F	Fine feathery needles, open canopy and straight trunk becomes more picturesque with time. Popular urban evergreen used for windbreaks and Christmas trees.
DECIDUOUS					
Black Walnut	75	50	M	F	Native tree that provides excellent shade, home to wildlife and food for humans and animals.
Common Persimmon	60	35	S	P-F	A native tree that is easily recognized in winter by its rugged, blocky bark. Female trees produce fruit that are edible after the first frost.
Northern Pecan	100	75	M	F	Large, straight-trunked nut tree native to river bottoms and rich fertile soils. The delicious nut ripens in the fall.
Shumard Oak	60	40	R	P-F	A strong long lived oak with beautiful fall colors. Very adaptive to urban areas with poor drainage and compacted soil. Drought tolerant.
Overcup Oak	70	50	M	P-F	Very sturdy shade tree that will thrive in a wide range of soils. Displays reddish or gray-brown bark and uniform branches and rounded shape.
Pin Oak	70	50	R	F	Native oak often found in wet areas, floodplains, wetlands, and low areas. A favorite Oak to use as a shade tree.
Red Maple	60	40	M-R	P-F	Boasts brilliant deep red or yellow fall color with red stems in winter.
Thornless Honeylocust	70	70	R	F	The lacy foliage of this attractive tree provides dappled shade. Durable, adaptable, and tolerant of a wide range of soil conditions as well as drought and road salt. This tree has a nice yellow fall color.
SHRUBS					
Gray Dogwood	15	15	S	S-P-F	Very adaptable, native shrub that is excellent for naturalizing, especially in difficult sites, such as ponds and stream banks. Creamy white clusters of flowers in May, followed by berries in late summer enjoyed by birds.
Ninebark	10	10	M	P-F	A cold-hardy, tough native shrub used for mixed borders. Pinkish-white flower clusters in late spring.
Red Chokeberry	8	8	S	P-F	Shrub with lovely white spring flowers followed by larger, more abundant glossy red fruit and brilliant red fall foliage.
